## St. Joseph

This Fourth Sunday of Advent, as we hear about the birth of Christ, Joseph is introduced into the life of Mary and Jesus. St. Joseph plays a key role in protecting Mary and her preborn Child.

I'd like to focus on the role **Joseph** plays and the attribute of courage that he demonstrates.

St. Joseph is the patron saint of a myriad of causes, especially those of fathers, families, married couples, children, pregnant women, workers, craftsmen, doubt, the dying, a happy and holy death, and the Universal Catholic Church.

**St. Joseph, the foster father** of **Jesus**, is one of the most loved saints because he is the **man** whom **God** chose among all others to be the special **Guardian** of **Jesus and Mary**, His Holy **Mother**.

Joseph was the human guardian of the Holy Family and because of this sacred familial bond and divinely given mission, Joseph is also the foster-father to all Christians, including you and me.

**Joseph** is truly the "silent figure" and <u>no spoken words</u> have been recorded in the **New Testament**.

Mary is only recorded twice in Scripture.

Once, at the Annunciation when She pronounces her Fiat—her submission to God's Plan and then at the Wedding Feast of Cana when Mary told the waiters, "Do whatever He tells you."

- I. St. Joseph and his role in the Economy of Salvation.
  - a) Joseph was "of the House and Lineage of David" (Lk. 2:4). Because of this ancestry, Joseph is the linkage between the Old Covenant made with Abraham and Moses, and the New Covenant with Jesus the Christ. We participate in this Covenant through the Sacrifice of the Holy Mas—the Eucharistic Celebration.
  - b) Joseph "prepares" the way for Jesus, the Messiah, who will establish the new Kingdom of God and the New Promised Land.
  - c) St. Matthew identifies Joseph as a "righteous man."
    The biblical meaning of "righteous," suggests that
    Joseph lived by God's standards, kept faithfully
    Commandments of God, and reflected God's love.
  - d) The Betrothal and Marriage of Joseph.

It is at Nazareth where Joseph betrothed and married Mary who was chosen by God to be the Mother of Jesus, the Messiah.

## What does it mean that Joseph was betrothed to Mary?

A betrothal was a "pledge of promise to marry" that person to whom one pledged one's love and fidelity.

Today, we would call it an "official engagement."

Mary was simply "officially engaged" to Joseph when Jospeh discovered that Mary was pregnant.

Then, <u>after one year</u> of this formal engagement, the groom with joy and jubilation would go to the home of the bride and "carry" her off to their **new home** where the marriage would be consummated and where they would live together as husband and create a family.

- a) <u>Joseph Faces a Major Crisis Before Marriage</u>
  - Joseph <u>did not</u> know God's Divine Plan but he <u>did know</u> that Mary's Child was not his. As a result, the Gospel tells us that "he decided to divorce her quietly" (Mt. 1:19).
  - Joseph's decision—was both a sign of his integrity and a sign of profound love for Mary. Why?
- b) The Law went against Mary. According to the Laws of the Torah, in the section of Crimes Against Marriage,
  Joseph could have had Mary stoned to death for infidelity during their betrothal (Dt. 22.22).

Can you imagine the mental anguish that Joseph must have experienced at this shocking news?

I am sure that Joseph had to wander how many other people knew about the pregnancy, and how many townspeople already knew about this situation and by now they were gossiping about it and spreading it!

Joseph's heart surely must have been griefstricken, confused, and filled with disappointment.
The only solution he could think of was to depart
quietly without endangering the life of his beloved
Mary.

c) Then he had a dream from heaven!

God's angel—Gabriel appeared to Joseph in a

dream and solved the mystery and revealed the truth:

"Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary your wife into your home. For it is through the Holy Spirit that this child has been conceived in her. She will bear a son and you are to name Him Jesus, because He will save the people from their sins."

This heavenly message—so called—a dream, took place to fulfill what the Lord God had said through the prophet Isaiah:

"Behold, the virgin shall be with child and bear a son,
and they shall name Him Emmanuel," which means, "God is with us."
When Joseph awoke, he did as the Angel of the Lord had
commanded him and took his wife—Mary, into his home"

Joseph fulfilled the Angel's request without question or hesitation!

## d) The importance of the Dream.

It reveals the important **role** that **Joseph** played in the life of **Jesus.** 

Joseph took Jesus as his own Son, <u>named</u> Him, and thereby giving Him <u>legal recognition</u>, <u>legal personhood</u> and the proof that Jesus is the descendent of the House of David!

Joseph fulfilled his "call" by God by fulfilling all the commitments and obligations as spouse, father, and provider for the Holy Family, as a carpenter with great courage and tenacity!

Throughout his life, Joseph faithfully and unquestioningly obeyed God's laws and commandments, for this reason Joseph is given a great compliment in Scriptures when he is refer to as an "upright and just man!"

Joseph was holy, obedient and a reflection of God's Love and worthy of our esteem and affection and imitation.
